Manager of Agricultural Services Report for March/April 2022

D. McCann provided a verbal review of the Manager of Agricultural Services report.

Assistant Agricultural Fieldman Report for March/April 2022

A. Kynoch provided a verbal review of the Assistant Agricultural Fieldman report. Germination tests for oats have come in at an average of 94% germination. Verbenone pouches for Mountain Pine Beetle were received for distribution in June. Available haying and grazing leases on County-owned land are advertised on social media and will also be advertised in the newspaper.

Member Reports

Member at Large L. Seutter-Rosell reported on:

- Drought seminar was very good
- Would be interested in attending Weed School
- Delivery date for bees is tomorrow; preparations underway for their arrival

Member at Large M. Mueller reported on:

- Drought seminar was good, as was the Union Forage seminar
- Working on the land roller
- Photos of Buttercup infestations
- Article in Grainews on "big farms"



- Free business course by the Government
- Information on grants for Climate Change

Member at Large J. Bundt reported on:

- Glad to see moisture
- Drought recovery workshop – purchased a similar cocktail of seed that was recommended at the workshop; will be used on about 200 acres
- Getting ready to put crop in ground
- Moved 200 cows to Buck Mountain for calving
- Seed was purchased from a company in Manitoba and they asked that no herbicide be used
- Will use a combination of seed drill and broadcast

S. McKerry left the meeting at 1:34 p.m.

Councillor R. Swap reported on:

- Attended drought workshop
- Starting foaling
- Asked if aerating works

M. Mueller did not recommend aerating in spring because it dries the ground out too much. Fall is better to allow for snow melt to penetrate. Members discussed spraying foliar fertilizer rather than granular and it is to be used once leaves are emerged. The cost is significantly less.

Councillor A. Heinrich reported on:


- Spray on fertilizer has been used in the area, and works well, as long as a decent stand is existing.
- Calving is half-way done
- Lots of snow overnight is good for moisture but not for calving
- People still looking for hay
- Drought recovery workshop – enjoyed the producers’ presentations

Councillor D. Ekstrom reported on:

- Will attend the hemp conference Thursday and Friday

Long Standing Weed Issues

D. McCann reported on strategies for long term weed issues seen in the County. A report was generated on properties with weed issues active from

2018 and prior. Just over 1000 Weed Reports were identified, but the list still needs to be filtered further depending on size of infestation. Weed Inspectors can filter this down and use the Weed Matrix to prioritize. It was suggested that 10% of the most severe cases can be issued a Weed Notice. Certain weeds in specific areas of the County could also be targeted. The Board can set priorities.

Administration recommends targeting the top 10%, which would likely include a lot of the Buttercup. Hawkweed is also growing rapidly. Members discussed the priority of long-standing issues. Under the legislation, an Inspector's Notice can be issued at any point. The Weed Matrix does consider the history of non-compliance and will move the priority up. Members discussed moving the point value up further in weight for long-standing issues. Inspector's Notice has a date that must be complied with, along with the actions required to remedy. A management plan can be discussed with the landowner if multi-year work will be needed.

Discussion ensued surrounding targeting the top 10% which would include repeat offenders over several years. Members also discussed that year one of identifying weeds is also important to target prior to infestations worsening. The Weed Matrix will take this into account.

Members asked if the matrix score would be sent to the landowner along with the Weed Reports. It was felt that the matrix may confuse the issue further.

The Weed Matrix is intended to be used internally but can be provided to the landowner upon request.

NEW BUSINESS

Wild Boar Bounty

D. McCann provided information on the Wild Boar Bounty introduced by the Provincial government effective April 1, 2022. This is a one-year hunting program offering \$75 per pair of ears. The municipality would have to apply to be in the hunting program. If municipalities have trapping programs, they are not eligible for the hunting bounty. If accepted, Administration would be handling the program, with the municipality applying back to the Province to be reimbursed. In the past, the strategy of trapping entire sounders was preferred rather than hunting individual boars due to the fact they are very intelligent animals. Administration has not received any reports of wild boar within the County within the past few years.

D. Ekstrom left the meeting at 2:21 p.m. and returned at 2:23 p.m.

If a Provincial trapping program is currently in a municipality, that municipality is not eligible for the Provincial hunting program. Lac Ste. Anne and Woodlands Counties currently have trapping programs. The Municipal District of Peace and the Stettler County have signed up for the hunting programs.

It was noted that wild boar can still be shot, even if the bounty program is not in place in the municipality.


